Something that need's to be known!

In that particular time, the language that was spoken was Ancient Hebrew. When doing a comparison between the ancient Hebrew language with Modern Hebrew language, there are many differences. For instance the Ancient Hebrew language has only one vowel letter, which was the letter A (Ah), with the exception of the letter I in modern Hebrew translating to (Ayin). Other than the two vowel letters there are NO VOWEL points or extra vowel letters in the ancient Hebrew alphabet.

Nikkud/Niqqud

"A system of <u>diacritical</u> signs used to represent <u>vowels</u> or distinguish between alternative pronunciations of letters of the <u>Hebrew alphabet</u>. Several such diacritical systems were developed in the <u>Early Middle Ages</u>. The most widespread system, and the only one still used to a significant degree today, was created by the <u>Masoretes</u> of <u>Tiberias</u> in the second half of the first Millennium AD in the <u>Land of Israel</u> (see <u>Masoretic Text</u>, <u>Tiberian Hebrew</u>)."

Hebrew vowel points / Niqqud (נקוד טָבֵרְיָנִי)

This system of indicating vowels was devised by the Masoretic scholars in Tiberias in around 750 AD. It is known as Tiberian vocalization, Tiberian pointing, or Tiberian niqqud, or נִיקוּד טָבֵרְיָנִי in Hebrew.

Masoretic Vowel Points

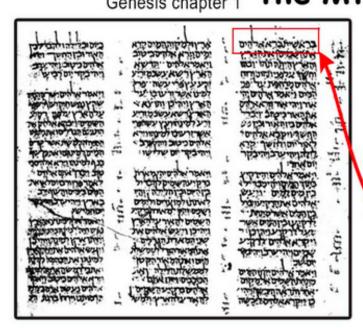
 "The oldest copies of the Masoretic Text only date back to the 10th century, nearly 1000 years after the time of Christ. And these texts differ from the originals in many specific ways. The Masoretic text is named after the Masoretes, who were scribes and Torah scholars who worked in the Middle East between the 7th and 11th centuries. The texts they received, and the edits they provided, ensured that the modern Jewish texts would manifest a notable departure from the original Hebrew Scriptures. Historical research reveals five significant ways in which the Masoretic Text is different from the original Old Testament: The Masoretes admitted that they received corrupted texts to begin with. The Masoretic Text is written with a radically different alphabet than the original. The Masoretes **added vowel points**, which did not exist in the original. The Masoretic Text **excluded several books** from the Old Testament scriptures. The Masoretic Text includes changes to prophecy and doctrine"

The Masoretes were a small pocket of scribes working at Tiberias who developed a meticulous counting system for copying scripture. They added vowels and punctuation to the Aramaic-Hebrew script of the first century AD as seen in the dots and dashes in modern Hebrew.

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The Matres Lectionis Vowel Letter System

• "In the spelling of Hebrew and some other Semitic languages, matres lectionis (English: /ˈmeɪtriːz lɛktiˈoʊnɪs/; from Latin "mothers of reading", singular form: *mater lectionis*, from Hebrew: ' אָם קָרִיאַה, k'ri'a) refers to the use of certain consonants to indicate a vowel. The letters that do this in Hebrew are aleph א, he iand yod . 'The yod and waw in particular are more often vowels than they are consonants. In Arabic, the *matres lectionis* (though they are much less often referred to thus) are <u>alif</u>, $w\bar{a}w$, $y\bar{a}'$ and to some extent <u>hā'</u> . The original value of the *matres lectionis* correspond closely to what is called in modern linguistics glides or semivowels"

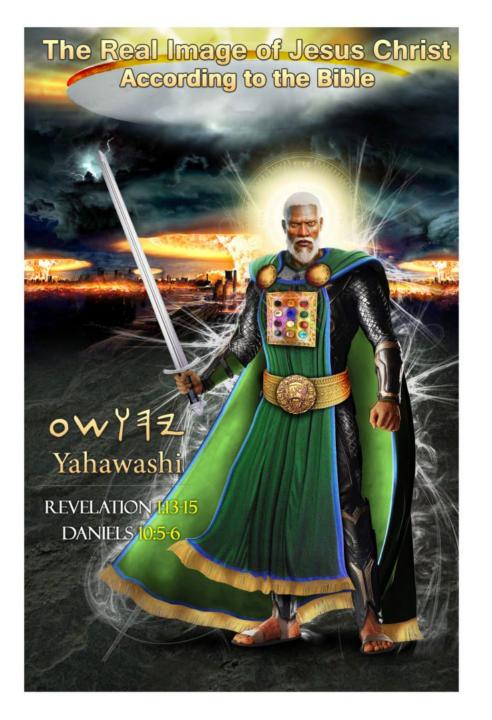
An author by the name of Charles William Wall has a book on Matres Lectionis called " Proof of the interpolation of the vowel letters in the text of the Hebrew Bible". In Charles book he talks about how this vowel pointing system was not apart of the ancient hebrew text or manuscripts. On page 5 of the introduction section it states, "the Hebrew Bible, as it issued from pens of it's inspired authors, was written without vowel-signs of any kind, whether points or letters." Page 19 it states "I may here by anticipation add, will be found equally to apply to the matres lectionis, after it shall have been proved that those letters do not, any more than the points, constitute part of the Hebrew scriptures as originally written". Author Charles also speaks upon how the Greeks came into power and forced the vowel letter system into the language. Page 8 in the introduction section it states,

• "In the first place, then, about two centuries after the termination of the Babylonian captivity, and while a considerable number of persons still continued to speak pure Hebrew as their vernacular dialect, Asia was invaded by a people who had introduced into the original alphabet the vast improvement of vowel-letters; and the Jews were, in consequence, forced in spite of their prejudices to learn a species of writing that made them acquainted with the use of such letters. In the second place, their scriptures were very soon afterwards translated into the tongue connected with this writing, by the order, as tradition tells us, of a Pagan government, and at any rate in a country in which they and their religion were peculiarly hated and despised."

Changing the original text and language of a culture is bad in itself, but the fact that it was coming from a corrupt religious government by the Pagans made it worse. What's interesting is the ancient Hebrew language was an unambiguous language. Meaning there were no vowel points because the ancient Hebrew text was not open to more than one interpretation. The pronunciation of the ancient Hebrew alphabet was clear, and it wasn't open to different interpretations. Ancient Hebrew language is a simple language with a simple sound.
